This past year has been one of big changes. After 46 years, the International Music Foundation changed its name to Classical Music Chicago in order to better reflect our vision and mission. We are committed to bringing classical music to the public with the highest level of artistry in mind, while being completely accessible in cost (free), location and format. With the new name, Classical Music Chicago also got a face lift with a new logo and website. While these changes are marking a new era for the organization, our beloved programs have remained the same.

In other exciting news, over this past year our newest program, Concerts for Wellbeing and Rejuvenation, gained some momentum. Through this program, Classical Music Chicago is bringing high-caliber classical music to the lives of many people who are traditionally overlooked, including populations of different abilities and less economic privilege. CMC has formed partnerships with Rush University Medical Center and the Southwest Senior Regional Center as performance sites to reach audiences who would otherwise be unable to attend. In the upcoming year, we will be working on expanding partnerships with other organizations to provide access to new underserved communities.

Finally, with our organizational updates we also welcomed three new Board members: Jake Babcock-Sopel, Marlon Rucker and William Fulbrook Hanna. These new Board members bring fresh energy and ideas to the organization. I am excited to have these Board members participate as the organization continues to evolve to meet the needs of our audiences and artists.

Thank you to all of you who have helped us stay strong during challenging times for nonprofit organizations. Because of our audience members and donors, Classical Music Chicago continued to thrive during and after the pandemic, when many other arts organizations closed their doors. We are here because of you.

ABOUT CLASSICAL MUSIC CHICAGO

Since 1976, Classical Music Chicago (CMC) has offered a variety of unforgettable classical music performances by up-and-coming and established artists throughout the Chicago community. A celebrated innovator from the very beginning and one of the first to focus on the importance of accessibility, CMC has been presenting concerts free to the public since day one.

CMC honors the legacies of its predecessor organizations: the International Music Foundation (IMF), founded by Chicagoan Al Booth in 1977, and Rush Hour Concerts (RHC) founded by pianist and civic leader Deborah Sobol in 2000.

MISSION

We believe music to be life-affirming. Our mission is to expand access to classical music; to enhance opportunities for artists early in their professional careers; and to engage audiences in various settings through performance, education, and participation.

DAME MYRA HESS MEMORIAL CONCERTS

The **Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concerts** began in 1977 and were modeled on the series launched by Dame Myra Hess in London during World War II. CMC's Hess concert series today presents top caliber emerging artists in a lunchtime concert each Wednesday at Seventeenth Church of Christ Scientist Chicago. Each concert is also broadcast live on 98.7 WFMT radio.

Concert highlights from the 2022-23 season include performances by: the Terra String Quartet, winner of the 2022 Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition; pianist Evren Ozel, 2023 Avery Fisher Career Grant recipient; violinist Sirena Huang, winner of the International Violin Competition of Indianapolis; and Crystal Jiang, 2021 Wideman International Piano Competition winner.

RUSH HOUR CONCERTS

Rush Hour Concerts began in 2000 as a welcoming summer concert series that removed accessibility barriers. Concerts take place each Tuesday, June through August at St. James Cathedral. Excerpts from the concerts are often re-broadcast on 98.7 WFMT.

Concert highlights from the 2022-23 season include: four cellists from the Chicago Symphony Orchestra – Brant Taylor, Ken Olsen, Karen Basrak and Katinka Kleijn performing music for cello quartet; violinist Janet Sung in concert with pianist Marta Aznavoorian performing works by Debussy, Schumann and Ravel; and a quintet with members of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and Lyric Opera Orchestra – Scott Hostetler, oboe; Susan Warner, clarinet; Yuan-Qing Yu, violin; Diane Mues, viola; and Rob Kassinger, bass performing quintets by Prokofiev and Kat Soupenetsky.

CONCERTS FOR WELLBEING AND REJUVENATION

Classical Music Chicago is expanding its reach to traditionally overlooked audiences through our newest program, **Concerts for Wellbeing and Rejuvenation**. We have piloted several performances through Rush University Medical Center and continue to explore potential partners for future concerts.

During the 2022-23 season, the Thalea String Quartet performed at Southwest Regional Senior Center, in collaboration with Rush University Medical Center's Department Social Work and Community Health. Feeback from the Senior Center was overwhelmingly positive. Many of the audience members had never attended a classical music performance and were thrilled with the live classical music experience.
